Court reengineering. With the help of my judicial colleagues, five years ago Washington County took a hard look at the judicial processes and decided we could do better. In making changes we have become a better court in all types of cases and have been able to shift resources from the criminal case load to both family and civil case loads. In so doing we have gone from a county in which civil litigants were unable to get a trial or had to endure multiple resets before a trial to a court which rarely resets civil cases due to lack of judges. I am also very proud of the work I have done over the last three years to add judicial resources to Washington County. With the help of Chief Justice Balmer, and local legislatures, Washington County will be adding its first new judge in over 15 years.

Mental Health and the courts. For a variety of reasons, the courts have become the governmental entity responsible for too many mentally ill people. I have and intend to continue to work with many of our community partners to defer mentally ill people before they become entangled in a system not designed for the mentally ill.

John Adams & James R. Ellis. John Adams, a young and newer attorney, knew citizens in Boston would be very upset with anyone who represented the British Soldiers accused of shooting Boston citizens during the Boston Riots. Despite that knowledge, his belief that everyone deserves representation trumped whatever consequences might come. James Ellis taught me it is okay to disagree and not like certain laws, nonetheless, it is not up to a judge to do anything other than follow them.
