After 1991, I handled a wide variety of cases ranging from a class action securities case to plaintiff's personal injury claims.

In the most recent years before being appointed to the bench, I handled mainly criminal defense in state and federal courts.

Over the past five years, I have presided over countless court and jury trials including aggravated murder with a potential death penalty phase, child abuse prosecutions and property crimes. I have handled a wide range of civil cases including claims under the Employer Liability Law and condemnation cases. In addition, I have presided over family law trials ranging from child custody disputes to child and spousal support determinations.

Presiding over an Aggravated Murder case in 2014 which included a potential penalty phase with the death penalty as an option for the jury. This case required a tremendous amount of work. New and sometimes unexpected issues arose before and during trial relating to the guilty except for insanity defense. I kept a running 'to-do' list (which was several pages long) in order to track every issue which needed to be addressed. The issues ranged from pretrial discovery to important evidentiary objections. I worked on these issues at night and on weekends in order to do my best to ensure procedural and substantive fairness to both sides and also to be respectful of the jury's time and to avoid unnecessary delays. 20) Briefly describe an issue, related to Oregon's justice system, that is of particular interest or concern to you, or that you have interest in working toward improving.

Legal Education: Many lawyers and judges for several years have been concerned with the trial abilities of both young and veteran lawyers. Law Schools have been criticized for not providing adequate training in trial skills. I have taught both trial practice and evidence in order to help lawyers handle themselves in the courtroom and become effective litigators.
