Before assuming the bench, I was a partner in a law firm that focused on criminal defense and juvenile law. I tried misdemeanor and felony cases--from DUII to Murder--and handled juvenile delinquency and dependency cases as well. Since, taking the bench I have presided over criminal, civil, and juvenile cases.

As the Public Defender in Twin Falls, Idaho, I argued several cases before the Idaho Court of Appeals.

As Circuit Court Judge, I have acted as a mediator in judicial settlement conferences and have helped to resolve criminal and civil cases in that capacity.

Prior to becoming a judge, my professional career was devoted to protecting the rights of my clients, many of whom were economically and/or educationally disadvantaged. I took pride in that role, and came to love the potential of our legal system, a potential that is sometimes unrealized. I wanted to become a judge because I hope I can do more to help our justice system reach its full potential in that role than I could as a trial attorney.

23) Briefly describe your philosophy of the judicial role, the qualities that are most important for the role, and the greatest challenges to the role.

The judge is the pillar of the rule of law, which has three basic principles. First, the government is bound by the law. Second, all people are treated equally. Third, there are certain enduring human rights that must be protected. A judge should be detached, independent, and fair. A judge is called upon to make dozens of decisions every day, and the challenge is to be decisive and yet reflective in making those decisions in a detached, independent and fair manner.

24) Briefly describe a case, or a legal issue on which you worked, of which you are particularly proud, or which is reflective of your legal ability, work ethic, judicial philosophy, or temperament.

I once represented a young mother accused of scalding her 2-year-old daughter. Through investigation and research I was able to show that the child likely had suffered an allergic reaction and had not in fact been scalded. My client was found not guilty of the charge. I am proud that through my efforts and the efforts of the entire defense team, this mother was allowed to remain at liberty and be reunited with her daughter.
